Chat with Anoulack...

Retirement was short-lived for long-term Eschol Park resident and former primary school principal, Anne Sheldrick, when she took up an opportunity to help others through the Macarthur No Interest Loan Scheme (NILS).



How did you come to work at Macarthur NILS?

I was engaged with Macarthur NILS in a volunteer capacity for around two years. Prior to this, I had been retired for a year after more than 30 years teaching at public schools throughout south west Sydney, including as deputy principal of Campbelltown North, principal at Glenfield and Prestons. When a role became available to do microfinance work and coordinate volunteers at Macarthur NILS, I jumped at the chance and haven't looked back.

Who can apply for NILS?

NILS loans are only available to people on a low income. This includes, but is not limited to, anyone who receives support from Centrelink, holds a Centrelink Health Care Card or a Pension Card. They must be living in the Campbelltown,

Camden or

Wollondilly Local Government Areas (or adjoining postcodes). There are also special circumstance loans for people who have been incarcerated or are leaving a domestic violence situation. Eligibility criteria apply.

What can NILS cover?

Loans of up to \$1200 are available for purchasing new household items such as whitegoods and furniture, medical equipment, home computers/laptops or vehicle registration. There are no fees, no charges and no interest. There is no limit to the number of loans available.

Tell me about NILS' philosophy.

NILS' motto is Engage, Enable and Empower. Those on low incomes who use the service are treated with personal dignity and supported in gaining a degree of financial control and empowerment in their lives. It is a local project and works through the recycling of a pool of community money. As each person repays their loan that money becomes available for new loans. Macarthur NILS is a project of the Presentation Sisters and is run out of the Nagle Centre in Campbelltown. The NILS program in Australia had its roots in the Good Shepherd Sisters. and receives support from various government, business and community groups throughout Australia.

What do you enjoy about your role?

The opportunity to work with many dedicated volunteers, to give back to the community and help transform people's lives for the better.

How do you spend your spare time?

I enjoy reading, knitting, cooking and travelling, as well as spending time with my husband, Phil, and three sons. (Anne and Phil are due to celebrate their 40th wedding anniversary in February 2017.)

You're a big fan of the local area?

Yes, I am. Phil and I have lived in Eschol Park for 36 years and were among the suburb's first residents. We love the open space, the sense of community, the relaxed vibe and proximity to facilities. It's a wonderful place to call home.
