Not surprisingly, Scrap the M5 East Toll was overwhelmingly the number one issue in my electorate. The M5 East Toll – a new tax on an old road – is unfair and places an unacceptable financial burden on commuters in south-west Sydney.

Here are the other top priorities as voted by my constituents:

- Protect our green open space;
- A local Service NSW Centre;
- More policing and safer streets;
- More local jobs; and
- A lift for Macquarie Fields Station.

Further, other issues relevant to the electorate included more footpaths, playgrounds and recreational open space; save the Hurlstone Farm; invest in more TAFE courses and training opportunities; and upgrade and air-condition our local schools.

The Liberal Government has consistently ignored our needs and failed to deliver vital infrastructure and services for our rapidly growing community.

I am appalled that there is once again no money for lifts at Macquarie Fields Station in the 2020-21 Budget. My constituents have been pleading for basic infrastructure and equal access to the transport network for years.

But the Liberal Government keeps allocating money for upgrades in their own electorates, despite an Auditor-General's report saying there is a greater need for lifts at Macquarie Fields.

I am proud to say that my campaigns for a new school in Edmondson Park and an upgrade to Passfield Park School have paid off with the Liberal Government finally allocating money in this year's budget after years of inaction.

But the \$3 million for Edmondson Park is just a drop in the ocean and I still want answers on when all the money needed for construction will be allocated.

I will keep the Liberal Government accountable to make sure our area is not short-changed.

HOW DID YOU GET INVOLVED WITH INGLEBURN ROTARY?

Ingleburn Rotary has always been a strong supporter of James Meehan High School where I was principal. When I retired in July 2016, I spent 18 months concentrating on myself and my family. I was then encouraged – or perhaps persuaded – by some long-time Ingleburn Rotarians to join and so here I am. I'm glad I put my hat in the ring. As well as being President, I am also Director of International projects. This is a role I particularly enjoy given my ongoing interest and association with Nepal.

TELL US ABOUT YOUR EARLY EXPERIENCES IN NEPAL.

My first trip to Nepal in 2018 was the start of an ongoing association and affinity for the country. I thought I was going to do some teaching. Six months before that trip, my daughter Katie said: 'Mum, we're going

to Base Camp.' I'm always one to rise to a challenge so my reply was: 'Ok. What do I need to do?' It was a gruelling six months of specialised altitude and fitness training. We made it to Base Camp on ANZAC Day, which was special. The trek to Base Camp was gruelling but magical at the same time. What did I learn from the experience? That if you put your mind to it, you can achieve anything.

YOU CONTINUE TO TRAVEL TO NEPAL AND SUPPORT LOCAL FAMILIES.

Yes, I've grown very fond of Nepal and its people. We did a homestay with the family of our guide from Everest Base Camp and are educationally supporting two schools in his village, Taruka. Both schools suffered severe damage in the 2015 earthquakes. This hindered young people's education. As an educator, this was heartbreaking. I also joined a Rotary aide tour and discovered how we could help.

WHAT HAS COVID MEANT FOR THESE COMMUNITIES?

Tragically, the COVID-19 pandemic will have a lasting impact for generations of people around the world. In Nepal, many children are missing out on an education and are being forced into child labour or child marriage. The pandemic has excaberated existing cycles of disadvantage and this is where organisations such as Rotary can make a small but significant difference to people's lives. Ingleburn Rotary has organised two food distributions this year in Taruka to help feed 50 families. Without this support, people would go hungry.

TELL US ABOUT YOUR FAMILY.

My parents emigrated from England in 1958 with my sister Deborah and I when we were very young. My mum, Brenda, and my late father, Bill, settled in Casula where he worked as a manager at Ingham's. Later, they moved to Macquarie Fields before they settled in Ingleburn, where they lived for 17 years. Mum has always been actively involved in the community and trained to be a Brownie and Girl Guides leader - one of the first in Casula. As well as working in schools and later accounting, my mum is a member of Probus and the Campbelltown Senior Cyber Seekers. She is also a member of Ingleburn Rotary. Continuing the education tradition, both my own daughters - Katie and Rebecca - now work as teachers and I'm proud of their achievements.

WHAT DO YOU LOVE ABOUT THE LOCAL AREA?

Accessibility to everything – transport, shops and the hospital. We're close to the south coast and everything you need is right here in our local area. You don't have to go anywhere else.

WHAT ABOUT THE FUTURE?

I enjoy spending time with my grandson, George – the first boy in our family in 38 years! He is our little prince. I look forward to travelling to Nepal when possible and making a contribution to our local community through Ingleburn Rotary. I'll continue to contribute to the education sector too. I'm currently at Cabramatta High School one day a week as the Alumni Coordinator. I love connecting students, staff, parents and the community who attended the school from 1959 until the present.
